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ON THE ANNIVERSARY YEAR...

As we marked the Anniversary of 125 years from July 29th, 1900, our hearts were filled to the brim with gratitude and a sense of awe.

The story of the Sisters of St. Martha began with a humble call to serve as homemakers at St. Francis Xavier University, a call extended by Bishop John Cameron who invited us into the sacred rhythms of domestic life for the college. Fifteen women responded to the invitation to begin a new Congregation in Antigonish, Nova Scotia.

From our beginnings, we were committed to responding to the needs of the time, and it is that spirit of discernment and generous service that has guided us through the past twelve plus decades. Our journey has called us to let go of the familiar, to surrender what once sustained us, and to step forward into the unknown with trust. Our collective "Martha yes" led us from kitchens and laundries to hospital wards where we worked to address the health care needs of the community with compassion and care. It also led us into the classrooms

of rural communities, recognizing the transformative power of education. As poverty and hardship persisted, we heard the cries for justice and stepped into the work of social service—advocating for those often forgotten and fiercely loving those in most need.

Today, that same voice continues to call us. We stand as advocates for social justice, for affordable and dignified housing, and for our sacred Earth whose voice must no longer be silenced. We carry forward the Mission and Charism of Gospel Hospitality in collaboration with many kindred spirits who walk beside us—we are grateful for your presence.

We, the Marthas, are committed to a life of transformation—a sacred journey that spans a lifetime. Though each of us walks this path from a different place, we are united in spirit, purpose, and mission. We bring our unique gifts and our strengths and weaknesses to this communal call, knowing that together

we move ever deeper into the mystery of God's love.

We hold fast to undaunted hope, allowing it to shape our hearts and inform the emerging future we help to build—one that honorus our past and embraces God's unfolding promise.

We embrace this anniversary year rooted in tradition, alive in the present, and ever attentive to the Spirit's call. This celebration is not ours alone. With hearts full of gratitude, we embrace the future, trusting that our collective witness will continue to be a light for justice, hospitality and the healing of Earth.

CANADIAN RELIGIOUS CONFERENCE (CRC)

During the Canadian Religious Conference (CRC) Assembly held in Montreal on May 22nd-25th, Sr. Brendalee Boisvert, CSM, was re-elected to a second, 2-year term, as President of the CRC.





Her re-re-election was met with great affirmation in the form of a standing ovation. Members of the Canadian Religious Conference and their teams showed their appreciation for Sr. Brendalee's leadership as well as her desire and commitment to improve her French language skills—she is only the second English speaking Religious to serve as President. Her dedicated service to the organization is a significant contribution to building community among Religious Women and Men throughout Canada.

UISG PLENARY

On May 5-9th, Sister Brendalee Boisvert attended the 23rd International Union Superiors General (UISG) Plenary in Rome. The theme was "Consecrated Life: a Hope that Transforms".



This Assembly is one of the most significant events in the life of the <u>Union</u>. It brings together Superiors

General of Religious Institutes and Congregations from around the world, offering them the opportunity to engage in dialogue and reflection on the theme of consecrated life at an international level. Many view it as a special time to *journey together as pilgrims of hope*.

This particular year, Sister Brendalee attended the Plenary during the exciting time of the Conclave, and experienced the thrill of the *white smoke* and election of Pope Leo XIV! Among the many highlights was the opportunity to visit the tomb of

ATRI CONFERENCE

MARTHA'S PLACE AT GALILEE CENTRE, ON

On September 19th, Sr. Brendalee Boisvert attended the blessing of a newly renovated space at Galilee Centre in Arnprior, ON now named Martha's Place. This space is dedicated to fostering community, personal growth, and spiritual enrichment.

The Sisters of St. Martha first arrived at the Galilee Centre in 1975. Sr. Teresa Ryan, CSM, along with Father Roy Boucher, OMI, laid the foundation stone of the Galilee Centre. Soon after, Sisters Patrice LaRusic and Rosalee Lavalee joined Sr. Teresa in forming the first Martha community to reside in the White House on the property.





Over the years, many Sisters of St. Martha served in ministry at Galilee or participated in its one-year Renewal Program. It was during such a program that Sr. Brendalee herself first encountered the Marthas. Through spiritual direction with Sr. Teresa Ryan, she discerned and embraced her call to join the Congregation.

Sr. Brendalee was honoured to take part in the blessing of Martha's Place. Father David Perrin, Chair of the Galilee Board, welcomed her along with guests, friends, and volunteers. A special lunch was shared before the formal blessing ceremony. This event marked Galilee Centre's 50th anniversary—a celebration of gratitude and a reaffirmation of the deep and enduring connection with the Sisters of St. Martha. It was a privilege to be part of this meaningful milestone.

COADY ARBORETUM DEDICATION

On September 18, 2025, the Sisters of St. Martha and the StFX Coady Institute gathered at St. Theresa's Garden for a meaningful ceremony to dedicate four Black Ash trees.

The initiative began after Hurricane Fiona in 2022, when the Sisters lost many trees on their land and Coady Institutute generously offered support. The Black Ash, chosen for its cultural significance to the Mi'kmaw people, aligned with Coady's Indigenous Women in Community Leadership program.

With care from Michael Overmars, Jake Monroe, and Brian Haines, the young trees were nurtured to planting size.

During the ceremony, Executive Director Eileen Alma unveiled a plaque inscribed with the words: "With shared commitment toward social justice, truth and reconciliation. Coady Institute." She described the dedication as a symbol of lasting friendship and a shared commitment to reconciliation and social justice.

CSM FACTS

The Martha Justice Ministry was founded in 2016 through the merging of the Social Justice and Ecology Committees, uniting their shared commitment to justice for people and the planet.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

- ♦ Since their founding in **1900**, the Marthas have encountered the marginalization of those who are poor and vulnerable. Initially, they distributed relief to the people living in poverty and cared for the vulnerable in institutions, easing poverty through charity.
- ♦ Since **1920s**, they partnered with reform-minded clergy in the Antigonish Movement to improve rural education. By the 1930s and 1940s, their focus expanded to community development and economic self-reliance through study groups and coops.
- ♦ In the **1950s**, they pressed for reform of the social services system and for changes in social legislation. Later, they took part in public advocacy events and demonstrations and worked on social justice issues through the Martha Social Justice Committee, established in the early 1980s.
- ♦ In **2010**, in collaboration with the Women's Resource Centre, the Social Justice Committee founded the **Antigonish Coalition to End Poverty**, dedicated to eradicating poverty in the Town and County of Antigonish and beyond. A number of community initiatives have grown out of this coalition, including the Antigonish Affordable Housing Society. Sr. Marion Sheridan, CSM, was a founding member and dedicated leader of the latter.

ECOLOGICAL JUSTICE

During the 1990s, the Marthas embraced the *Universe Story* and the idea of the interconnectedness of all creation. They moved from awareness to action and formed their first **Environment Committee** in **2002**. Five directions were identified for making big and small changes.



Notable achievements include changing to sustainable housekeeping products, the opening of the Contemplative Trail, labyrinth and two hermitages. New recycling and composting practices earned the Congregation the 2011 Mobius Environmental Award.

THE MARTHA JUSTICE MINISTRY CORE GROUP

brings together Sisters of St. Martha and lay collaborators united by a shared passion for justice. They guide and support the Ministry's vision and the work of the Coordinator—shaping strategy, creating foundational documents, and stewarding the budget.

THE MJM COORDINATOR leads the educational and advocacy work of the Ministry—developing programs, sharing resources, and collaborating with coalitions and networks on key issues of social, ecological justice, and reconciliation. The Coordinator also oversees the Martha New Growers program, and serves as Liaison to the Sisters of Charity Federation UN NGO.



In 2000, between March and October, Marthas stood weekly, side by side with the Antigonish Women's Resource Centre and others for the World March of Women 2000 events.

Darlene O'Leary on finding her place in Martha Justice Ministry

Before coming to work with the Marthas, I spent many years as an academic, studying the work of Jesuit Bernard Lonergan and other theologians. My PhD at Saint Paul University in Ottawa focussed on ethics and economics in Lonergan's own original economic works. My question then was around the function of profit, not as a way for a few to become wealthy, but as re-directed to improving the standard of living for everyone. Lonergan's deeper understanding of economic rhythms helped to outline this ultimate purpose.

In the years following, I can see how I would have loved to have Pope Francis' Laudato Si'when I was doing my research, in its helpful framing of the connection between economic and ecological justice and integral ecology. Certainly, that work was being done by liberation and feminist theologians and others already but bringing integral ecology into Catholic Social Teaching would have reframed my own work. Now, I am finding an interest in revisiting Lonergan's work in reflecting on where we are as global and local economies struggling with increasing inequality and

the climate emergency. It is challenging work that is needed to address this and to meet the targets set out through the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

During my studies, I had the joy of working at Galilee Centre in Arnprior as the director. I know many Marthas know and love Galilee. It was lovely to be in that space of spiritual grounding. I had the pleasure of developing programs on social justice while there, as well as welcoming people to the land and Ottawa River. Being at Galilee affirmed my need for work that brought spiritual grounding, social and ecological justice, and reconciliation together. Thankfully, I'm able to do just that here with the Marthas.

Another important experience for me was working as a socio-economic policy analyst with Citizens for Public Justice in Ottawa. I think CPJ was the place that allowed me to grow in understanding how academic work and faith and justice work can come together through policy and advocacy. I had the wonderful opportunity to work with a great team, and my own work focussed on poverty eradication. We were co-leads of the Dignity for All campaign that ran the annual Chew on This! events on the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty (October 17). We also developed an outline of a poverty eradication plan for Canada, a plan that mapped out the strategy we wanted to see from the federal government. This plan was released in 2015, and we think it influenced the federal government to develop its poverty reduction strategy. While the government's strategy wasn't what we hoped, it provided building blocks for continued work to end poverty.

I was so impressed when I started working with the Marthas to see the essential work that has been done with partners in Antigonish to address these fundamental issues that people living in poverty are facing, particularly through the Antigonish Coalition to End Poverty. Groups like the Antigonish Affordable Housing Society, Antigonish Community Transit, Basic Income NOW Atlantic Canada, and others are models for other communities working

to provide foundational support and structural change.

I think what continues to energize me in this work is the opportunity to deepen our grounding in integral ecology. We do this through time on the land, through the New Growers program supporting young farmers, sustainable farming, and food security, and through building relationships with Mi'kmaw communities. As we see things falling apart throughout the world and challenges in our own communities, I think we are offering space to deepen and to ground ourselves and others. Ultimately, I think we are nurturing a way of being in the world that is essential to our survival and thriving. How exciting to be part of this important work!



A conversation with Joanne Tompkins

Martha Justice Ministry Core Group member, Joanne Tompkins, is talking about her involvement in the Martha Justice Ministry Core Group.



Joanne Tompkins recently retired from a 40year career in public education. She spent the first 15 years of her teaching career in Nunavut working towards creating Inuit-based schooling. In 1996, she "moved South"and spent the next 25 years working in teaching education at StFX University. Her teaching, research, and service have been grounded in social justice and were centered on supporting equity, diversity, inclusion in schooling. She found the most joy being involved in partnerships building the capacity of Inuit, Mi kmaw and African Nova Scotian teachers. Prior to joining the Martha Justice Ministry Joanne was a member of the Antigonish Affordable Housing Board for 5 years. For the past 10 years she has been a co-facilitator with Terena Francis, Band Councillor at Pagtnkek, for the Kairos Blanket Exercise, providing education about Truth and Reconciliation to public schools and the wider public.

What inspired you to get involved with the Martha Justice Ministry?

I feel that they look at a broad range of social justice issues and they look at issues in a 'critical' way - looking for structural or systemic solutions that are grounded often in Catholic Social Teaching and the UN Sustainable Development Goals. They are involved in DEEP change.

What part of the ministry's work speaks to you the most? What's your 'why' for being part of this group?

I hope I bring some perspectives on Reconciliation related to the Calls to Action of the Truth & Reconciliation Commision (TRC) and the need for more public education on Treaties, TRC, as well as some knowledge of working 25 years with many Mi'kmaw communities in the province. I feel that the approaches used by the Martha Justice Ministry are more critical and look at issues from a systemic perspective - rather than say using a "charity" response that doesn't look at the larger deeper systems of colonization, Eurocentric thinking, capitalism. I also know the Marthas 'walk the walk' and that I could learn a LOT from being in the presence of these religious women. They have courage and wisdom...

Was there a moment that made you feel like, 'Yeah, I need to be part of this'?"

I think when we did the Blanket Activity with the Marthas, and with the Lenten Offerings. I also appreciate how the Marthas are willing to look critically at their roles within colonization...not many

organizations do that. I also appreciated being able to be part of the Basic Income conferences in both Ottawa and Halifax - and seeing the work that the *Basic Income NOW, Atlantic Canada* group is doing in trying to advance this very progressive social policy.

Did you always see yourself doing justice work like this, or did it just kind of happen?

I was extremely lucky to have been steeped in three social justice settings. One was being an educator in the Northwest Territories prior to Nunavut, and being involved in efforts to re-center Inuit language and culture into schooling. This was way ahead of its time - well before the TRC. We hardly even had the name 'colonization'... There were some amazing Inuit and non-Inuit who were incredibly progressive. While this was happening, the Baffin Divisional Board of Education in 1982 also committed itself to the inclusion of Inuit children with "special needs" into community schools in the territory and I was part of the lead team helping orient and support teachers to teach to groups of students that had previously been left out of public schooling. This thread of supporting student with diverse abilities and exceptionalities, as well as creating classrooms that expected and welcomed diversity, was one I continued in my role as a teacher educator at StFX University. Both these efforts were ahead of their time

and they deeply shaped me as an anti-racist inclusive educator (1982-1996).

Then, in 1996, I came South, to Antigonish as a teacher educator. The Mi'kmaw were just beginning their decolonizing journey

and StFX University was a key partner in creating a new 2-year BEd program that was grounded in equity, diversity and inclusion. Over 25 years, we saw 250+ Mi'kmaw students acquire a BEd degree and go back into their Mi'kmaw communities as educators. Over 100 Mi'kmaw educators also completed MEd degrees. I was very active in supporting this program, it created the capacity we now have in Mi'kmaw education in Nova Scotia.

These 3 experiences over 40 years grounded me in decolonizing work and I am grateful

for that. I also did grow up in a household that had connections to the Antigonish Movement and a father involved in his teachers union (and the power of unions). So it was not exactly a surprise I entered up in this work...

What's been the most meaningful part of being involved so far?

I think it is how much I learn from the other Core Group members. There is great cross talk of different areas of focus - the Martha New Growers, Integral Ecology, and much more....honestly I see the progressive nature of the Marthas in so many ways.

What keeps you coming back to the meetings and the mission?

I think more than ever in these times, there has to be places where we see possibilities... and working with people who see the systemic and structural nature of the deep

changes in consciousness we need ...it feeds my soul.

If someone asked you what the Martha Justice Ministry is all about, what would you say?

It is about trying to create the Kingdom of God on Earth - to advance that change of consciousness we need towards each other and the planet and all creation to really create a world in which LOVE rules.

What's something you've learned or experienced here that really stuck with you?

Probably watching how the Marthas 'are'... their way of being in the world..."standing in undaunted hope" AND they really understand Catholic Social Teachings and live by its principles. So they are really smart about social change...

Emboldened by our belief in the inherent dignity in terconnectednes of all creation, we strive on the path of right relationship, to contribute to the thriving of peaceful and resilient communities, locally and globally.

THE PEACE POLE

The Peace Poles project began in 1955 in Japan, initiated by Masahisa Goi. Moved by the devastation of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings, he dedicated his life to promoting peace and harmony throughout the world. The Bethany Peace Pole, one of over 200,000 around the world, carries the universal message for world peace "May Peace Prevail On Earth" inscribed


in 12 languages on its sides. It was placed on the Bethany grounds in 2001. On July 1st of that year, the Sisters gathered for a short dedication ceremony, and for several years afterward, they held weekly prayers for peace—welcoming people of all faith traditions and raising awareness about the importance of peacebuilding. The Peace Poles themselves stand as a symbol of this commitment, quietly inviting reflection and action toward a more peaceful world.

THE PEACE POLE ALSO **SYMBOLIZES THE CONGREGATION'S DEEP COMMITMENT TO PEACE.** IT REFLECTS THEIR **SERIOUS CONCERN FOR** FOSTERING A MORE JUST AND **COMPASSIONATE WORLD** THROUGH NONVIOLENCE, DIALOGUE, AND RESPECT FOR **HUMAN DIGNITY.**

frightening drought conditions, restricted access to wooded areas, and wildfires.



ORCIE LEARNING & LOBBYING



The Office of Religious Congregations for Integral Ecology (ORCIE) held its Learning & Lobbying Days in September in Ottawa. This was an opportunity for religious congregations, staff, and associates to participate in webinars and training on federal policy and campaigns on climate and ecological justice.

It was also an chance to take part in lobbying on Parliament Hill with MPs, staffers, and civil servants to share our priorities and our voices on these issues of urgency. Our group of about 10 participants included religious and congregational staff and associates from Nova Scotia, Quebec, and Ontario.

♦ There was a wonderful ORCIE webinar with the Climate Emergency Unit's Seth Klein and Anjali Appadurai on advocacy pointers and on how Canada can contribute our fair share in tackling the climate crisis. They shared their helpful perspectives and experiences in lobbying and advocacy, particularly drawing on ideas like a Youth Climate Corps and lessons about how

Canada has mobilized for emergencies in the past.

- ♦ We had in person lobbying preparation meetings at Saint Paul University in Ottawa
- ♦ Participants took part in the ORCIE Lobby Day on the Hill, with a full schedule of meetings with MPs and staff. We were pleased with the open conversations and things we learned in each of the meetings!

As a follow up to the Learning & Lobbying, congregations will be encouraged to use the materials ORCIE shares to meet with local MPs in their ridings.

ROOTED IN THE LAND: A CONVERSATION WITH EMMA

In spring and summer 2025, Martha Justice Ministry (MJM) engaged Emma Dixon, a StFX University student in Development Studies and Sociology, on a short-term, part-time contract. Emma has been working with Dr. Riley Olstead as part of a Youth-Elder alliance focussing on Indigenous traditional knowledge sharing, as well as land-based curriculum. During her time with MJM, she joined various meetings and events with wonderful enthusiasm and openness. She is now part of MJM Core Group.

What sparked your interest in working on land-based education?

Growing up in Unama'ki, otherwise known as Cape Breton, has given me a deep sense of connection to the land and water which surround me. My parents have always ingrained in me the importance of respecting and protecting our environment. This belief system, along with the guidance of Elder Albert Marshall and many others, led me to believe that working on land-based education is a way I can attempt to reciprocate value back to Mother Earth. I believe our future is in the hands of the youth, and we

can only make a positive change if we have the proper guidance and education. This, to me, takes the form of a land-based curriculum facilitated by Indigenous and settler youth and elders, so we have a diverse understanding of what the land means and contributes to our collective survival.

How did you become involved in the Elder-Youth Alliance and what has been your most profound learning from this experience?

I became involved with the Elder-Youth Alliance after sharing my struggles of being away from home with a mentor at StFX. I

told her how being in Antigonish—without the constant view of the water—left me feeling suffocated and disconnected. After that conversation, she introduced me to Elder Albert and a few others from both Mi'kma'ki and the traditional territories of the Musqueam and Squamish peoples, also known as British Columbia. From those initial connections, our group began to grow, and the Elder-Youth Alliance was formed. The most profound learning I've gained from this experience has come through the deep, personal relationships we've been able to build across generations and territories. These connections have

taught me the value of listening, of holding space for one another, and of grounding ourselves in both story and action. It's through these relationships that I've come to better understand the strength of intergenerational knowledge and the importance of community care.

What draws you to MJM, and how does that relate to your interest in Mi'kmaw knowledge and land-based learning?

Its deep commitment to justice, care for our common home, and the dignity of all beings. One teaching that has stayed with me is the importance of meeting people where they are at — a reflection of the ministry's profound respect for the interconnectedness of all life and our responsibility to live in right relation. What resonates most is how this work connects to intergenerational knowledge — something I believe we've lost touch with in today's fastpaced, individualistic world. Martha Justice Ministry creates a rare and meaningful space where wisdom is shared not just through words, but through presence, patience, and action. Being surrounded by so much life experience nourishes me both personally and spiritually. I feel grounded by the guidance offered — not just to me, but to the wider community. Learning from my Elders, both Indigenous and Settler, has shown me that knowledge isn't something to be consumed quickly, but something that grows through relationship, time, and care.

What do you hope to learn and engage in more deeply as you continue to work with MJM and with your programs at StFX University?

My hope is always to deepen my relationships with the life and land around me. I want to continue listening with open ears and an open mind — not driven by personal interest alone, but by a conscious commitment to honouring the life and relationships that surround me. I hope to engage in future efforts with humility, care, and a deeper awareness of the interconnectedness that grounds all meaningful work.

Is there anything else you would like to share about your learning and what brings you hope and energy in the work you are doing?

What brings me the most hope and energy in this work is how deeply my thoughts and experiences are valued by those I'm learning from and alongside. Feeling truly heard has given me the courage—and the nourishment — to see this not as "work," but as a way of living in harmony with all of ecology. I'm uplifted and strengthened by the people I surround myself with. Every member of the MJM and all the Sisters of St. Martha I've come into connection with has offered me a profound sense of hope and belonging. Their presence reminds me that I'm not walking this path alone — and that my age does not limit my ability to contribute meaningfully. Instead, I'm continually encouraged to grow, give back, and walk forward with purpose.

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


This summer, we were sad to hear the news that the wonderful Sisters of


